Housing

Bayview House, our daily support program and Bayview Cooperative our weekly support program, offer active and comprehensive client directed supportive housing with a focus on recovery.

Referring workers are asked to review criteria and intake procedures and call the Intake Coordinator prior to filling in the application to ensure program suitability. Completed applications will be processed by Toronto Mental Health & Addictions Supportive Housing Network. In all cases Bayview Community Services Inc. reserves the right to assess the suitability of its programs for any applicant. Case Management

Our intensive Case Management program provides services in northeast Toronto. Our Case Management clients have access to one and two bedroom units, when available, through our partnership with Toronto Community Housing Corporation.

Bayview Community Services, in partnership with Access 1, requires applicants to complete the Common Application Form for case management support. The referral form for case management services can be requested by calling our office, accessing our website or calling Access1 at 1-888-640-1934.
